







SYNOPSIS

As Kabwe comes of age, his Uncle Mapalo invokes what appears to be a long-held tribal tradition: he must slay an elephant to validate his manhood.

In reality, this is a pretext for something nefarious in which his Uncle Mapalo is deeply involved. Kabwe, an orphan always seeking acceptance, dutifully complies without questioning his uncle.

After a mother elephant is killed, leaving behind a baby, park authorities detain Kabwe, demanding to know the names of his associates. He manages to escape, but soon learns that his Uncle Mapalo's maize business is a front for trafficking -- and that he is in fact being groomed by his Uncle Mapalo to take over the family business.

Detained a second time, Kabwe bonds with an orphaned elephant named Chiware and begins to fall in love with a the park and the elephants. The park manager, Basil, and his chief ranger glimpse a kind side to his tough exterior and believe he is worth saving.

Kabwe soon learns from the chief ranger that his parents did not die of malaria, as he was raised by his uncle to believe. Rather, his parents were conservationists who were killed by a syndicate of which his Uncle Mapalo is also a part.

Kabwe must now decide whether to seek justice for his parents and the orphaned elephants, or to betray his Uncle Mapalo, the man who raised him like a son.

DIRECTOR'S STATEMENT

For more than twenty years, I immersed myself as a photojournalist in the lives of other people, documenting their greatest tragedies and achievements during unprecedented historical events. While traversing the planet across foreign cultures and complex geopolitical landscapes, I was exposed to every human emotion, as well as the circumstances and the psychology behind their expression. I now bring that to directing. Recognized as a staunch conservationist, I directed and produced a documentary called The Last Animals on wildlife trafficking and then campaigned with the film for ivory bans around the world and Executive Produced another. I love that Blood & Ivory is conservation driven, but what drew me most to the script was the nuanced complexity of its characters and the emotional terrain of the film.



The loneliness that comes with secrets, the guilt of betrayal - how repressing the truth manifests in interpersonal relationships, and family dynamics. Our friends are the family we choose and yet we are inextricably connected to people through shared blood that we would never choose as friends. The irrational loyalty to family - sometimes conflicted - but often like gravitational pull.

Epic landscapes and the peace and beauty of nature are not only metaphors for love, but also an expression of it, backdropped against the turmoil of a self-eroding inner world of a hidden family truth. The transformative power of mentorship; the ability for a person or chance encounter to change the course of one's life.

First love. The power or truth and justice. The terrifying discomfort and vulnerability of love. The search for redemption and the depths of love's ability to find a well of forgiveness. The universal internal dilemmas portrayed in Blood & Ivory will be subconsciously extenuated with an emphasis on Chiaroscuro in the cinematic approach, touching the hearts and internal worlds of viewers while also connecting them to the issues that threaten the existence of one of the most intelligent non human sentient beings on the planet. Lion is an inspiration for both the emotional and cinematic tone of the film






















DIRECTOR

KATE BROOKS

In 2010 Brooks' love for filmmaking was sparked while working as a cinematographer on the documentary "The Boxing Girls of Kabul". Brooks' first book, in the Light of Darkness: A Photographer's Journey After 9/11, was released in 2011 and selected by PDN as one of the best photography books of the year. In 2012-13, she was a Knight Wallace Fellow at the University of Michigan. There she researched the global wildlife Trafficking crisis before embarking on directing her first film. Kate Brooks career as a visual storyteller began as a photojournalist working. Her photographs were extensively published in TIME, Newsweek, Smithsonian and The New Yorker and exhibited in galleries and museums around the world. After chronicling conflict and human rights issues around the globe she turned her lens to cinema.

The Last Animals premiered at Tribeca Film Festival on Earth Day 2017 was awarded a Disruptor Award. The film was widely recognized for its ability to disrupt the status quo on policy and change hearts and minds, later winning Panda Award in consideration with Blue Planet II. The film was distributed through National Geographic, Hulu, Netflix and Discovery Plus. Based on the experiences Brooks had while making the film, she co-founded the nonprofit The Last Animals Foundation Brooks currently has two film projects in development: Blood & Ivory and Stalin's Children.

JOHN KANI

A native of South Africa, Dr. John Kani began his acting career with accolades on Broadway – a Best Actor Tony Award – and has continued that high quality work on the big and small screens with award winning performances in "Nothing But the Truth" which also won him a scriptwriting SAFTA and, most notably, in "Black Panther" wherein he reprised his role of T'Chaka from "Captain America: Civil War."

John's voice is also easily recognizable as Rafiki in "The Lion King." He continues to write and act for both stage and screen, with awards for all.

Born into a family of well-known artists of stage and screen in South Africa, Atandwa Kani has spent his entire life submersed in the world of superb talent. His first foray into the world of international theatre was as Ariel in "The Tempest" with his father, John Kani. He easily moved to television with roles in several US based series, but finally made the move to film with his role as a young Nelson Mandela in the film, "Mandela: Long Walk to Freedom." This led to several films, including playing the younger version of his father, John Kani's role, T'Chaka, in "Black Panther".

She received her MFA as an American Film Institute Screenwriting fellow after obtaining her JD from Lincoln Law School, and then formed her own production company, UnicVisions, which has produced the feature films, "Broken Angel" (which she also wrote), "Acts of Desperation," and "Brothers Broken." a multiple award-winning documentary.

In this capacity, he acted for several conservation and environmental NGOs and was a negotiator at the 1998 CITES Animals Committee Convention in Caracas, representing The Born Free Foundation.

For many years Porter was a trustee of The Kasanka Trust, a UK-based charity that part-funds the Kasanka National Park in Northeastern Zambia. He visited the Park many times, and in that capacity, observed not only the Park's conservation efforts but also the human stories behind ex-poachers turned gamekeepers.

This involvement gave Robert a unique perspective which inspired him to write the Blood & Ivory screenplay. He entered it into the ScreenCraft Jamaica Residency program in 2017 and was awarded coveted place on the residency and the opportunity to work with Steven de Souza.

His live performances included Live 8, Nelson Mandela's 90th Birthday Concert and the One Concert for his Holiness the Dalai Lama.



Emmanuel co-starred with Reese Witherspoon in the Warner Brothers motion picture, The Good Lie which tells the story of four young Sudanese refugees who win a lottery for relocation to the United States. The film debuted at Toronto International Film Festival before being released in 2014. Emmanuel starred as the adult lead in the major motion picture Africa United; a Pathé, UK Film Council and BBC Films presentation in association with Warner Bros, released in October 2010.
